Do I qualify?

In academic areas, a Master's degree in the discipline or closely related field is necessary. In technical areas, experience and knowledge matter more than a degree.

What times of day will I teach?

We need faculty at all times of day and evening. We are also looking for weekend faculty.

What fields are you looking for?

We are interested in faculty in all areas, but the following areas are especially desired: computer game design; digital media arts; web page design and development; computer programming; network administration; e-commerce; marketing; management; sociology; psychology; philosophy; foreign languages. And at our Educational Site in Sandoval County, we need teachers for English and Communications & Journalism.

Will I need to teach online?

Teachers can teach live, hybrid (half live & half online) or online. We'll even train you in online teaching. The use of technology in the live classroom is also exciting – come learn about it.

What will I be paid?

Although you are not going to get rich teaching as an adjunct faculty member, you will be earning more than at many 2-year post secondary institutions in New Mexico. The following pay chart is for one-credit hour, but most faculty teach 3 to 4 credit hour courses, so multiply to get the total pay.

BA/BS or technical training & skills: \$555
MA/MS/MBA: \$620
Ph.D./Ed.D./MFA: \$690
