### CAMPUS PROFILE

The University of New Mexico-Los Alamos (UNM-LA) has long been an integral part of Northern New Mexico. Our student population reflects the unique ethnic, cultural and socioeconomic diversity of the region. As a branch campus of the University of New Mexico, we continuously respond to community educational needs, while serving as a positive, productive force in the region.

UNM-Los Alamos continues to expand its service area. In addition to our central location in Los Alamos, we have off-site locations in Bernalillo, Cuba, and Jemez Springs. We also offer educational services at a number of pueblos, including Sandia Pueblo. UNM-Los Alamos also has dual enrollment agreements with many area high schools, including Los Alamos, Espanola, Pojoaque, and Bernalillo. This allows eligible high school juniors and seniors to take college level courses.

UNM-Los Alamos is an Hispanic-serving institution (HSI) with 41% of its students self-identifying as Hispanic. The American Indian population of UNM-LA continues to expand and in Fall 2006 we had fifty-four Native American students enrolled in credit courses.

## STUDENT SUCCESS

In 2006-2007, 105 students participated in the College Cornerstone Program, designed to provide foundational skills in math, English, reading, science, and other academic skills to academically under-prepared students.

Twenty-four 2006 high school graduates and GED recipients participated in the UNM-LA 2006 Summer Bridge program. Schools participating in the program included students from Bernalillo, Espanola, Escalante, Highlands, Los Alamos, Pojoaque, Rio Rancho, Sandia and West Mesa High Schools. Subsequently, twelve of those participants enrolled at UNM-LA in Fall 2006.

Fifty students received AA/AAS degrees and/or certificates in 2006-2007. Four of those students earned a certificate through the Electro-Mechanical Technology Student Training Program, which is co-sponsored with Los Alamos National Laboratory.

UNM-LA provides high quality instruction to area students. UNM-LA has a 10:1 student/instructor ratio. Seventy-four of our faculty have doctoral or masters degrees.

Thirty-six individuals received GEDs through Adult Basic Education Services during 2006-2007. Of those, fourteen enrolled in post-secondary programs at UNM-LA.

UNM-LA accommodated 124 students in its 64 unit student efficiency apartments.

In 2006-2007, 284 enrollments were recorded in Bachelor and Graduate Programs at UNM-LA that offer live classroom, on-line and instructional TV courses at the upper division and graduate level in many subject areas and disciplines, including University Studies, Engineering, Education Leadership, Nursing, Psychology, Sociology, Communication & Journalism, and Public Administration.



## COMMUNITY IMPACT

In the fiscal year ending June 2007, UNM-LA provided goods and services in the amount of \$1,079,813 within its service area.

Annual payroll expenditures of UNM-LA for the fiscal year ending June 2007 were \$2,430,754. UNM-LA has 146 full-time and part-time faculty and staff members. Eighty percent live in the tri-county area (Los Alamos, Santa Fe and Rio Arriba).

UNM-LA collaboratively hosts community events featuring locally, nationally and internationally recognized speakers, musicians and films. For example:

### SMALL BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

The Los Alamos Small Business Development Center accomplishments for the fiscal year 2006-07 include: processing 172 cases primarily in service, retail, and manufacturing businesses. The clients served by this SBDC represented the following ethnic/racial backgrounds:
